- I like the colour I think there's a good thing happening with the contrast between the wintery blue tones and the reds in the skin. I would be included to play with that colour pallet in post.
- Yep. Colour almost every time which covers a range from cool to warm. I think reducing the colour temp or desaturation would create a better atmosphere in the images.
- I prefer the colour. I very much liked the first set with the man and the terminal name. The others felt a little like a fashion shoot.
- Its a good location choice setting off on a journey. think I prefer the b+w because it has a more moody tone than the brighter blue lighting and sky.
- I rather like the colour versions but if you are aiming for a more moody atmosphere agree with Catherine the B&W probably convey this more .
- I'd go for the colour version as well, however, the blue cast is a bit too much for my taste.
